Our Humanitarian Committee continues to do their due diligence by keeping in touch with our "wards", to ensure that they are coping well with the isolation brought about as a result of the pandemic.

The shroud of COVID-19 meant that all planned TTAO activities for this fiscal year had to be cancelled. This however allowed us time to really focus on some projects that had been put on the back burner. The Executive and Social Committees spearheaded projects for the Mon Repos R.C. School, Trinidad and the Mason Hall Government School, Tobago. As well, the Education Committee, in conjunction with the Principal and staff of the Vistabella Primary School in Trinidad, is working on the logistics of awarding the Nazru Deen Scholarship 2020 to a student at that school. Details on all of these projects are outlined further on in this newsletter.

We are hoping to provide some type of virtual entertainment in the near future. You will be provided with information by email, Facebook and telephone. If however, you have any suggestions, please feel free to share them with us. You can use our email or Facebook page to contact us.

In August 2020 one of our members, Rose Leblanc, set up the Facebook page "Masks for kids and adults Ottawa", to sell locally made non-medical face masks. The intent is to raise funds for charities, as the Friends of Serviam (FOS) Group was unable to hold its annual fundraiser this year. The funds raised were put into the FOS pot, along with donations from supporters and other fundraising ventures. The FOS members decided that once again, the TTAO would be the beneficiary of its fundraising efforts and will be receiving a cheque in the amount of \$1,000.00 towards the 2021 C.L.R. James Scholarship fund. It is said that when you give, you receive two-fold. Mon Repos R.C. Primary School Project

Earlier this year, the TTAO received a request for help from the Parent Teacher Association (PTA) of the Mon Repos R.C. School, for 40 students who were desperately in need of uniforms, books, and school supplies. Last year the PTA provided these necessities to 30 plus students, however this year saw an increase in that number.

The Executive unanimously decided that it would support the venture and marshalled the assistance of the Social Committee to raise the funds required, by appealing to our membership. The TTAO set an ambitious goal of raising \$2,000.00 CAN by the end of July, 2020. We are pleased to announce that we surpassed that expectation and were able to forward to the President of the PTA the sum of \$4,380.00 CAN. The final tally was \$33,300.00 TT, which included a very generous \$10,000 TT donation from Guardian Life of the Caribbean Ltd. The rest of the donation was entirely from the members and supporters of the TTAO.

The PTA was able to purchase all the required books on the list, the uniforms and some stationery. In fact, they were so successful, that they generously paid it forward by helping some needy students from another school.

The TTAO, deeply appreciates the contribution of Guardian Life of the Caribbean Ltd. in Trinidad and Tobago. Sincere thanks also to all of our members and supporters who so generously donated towards making a better life for some very needy students in our homeland.

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"Selling Soup to purchase laptops"

An article, featured in the Trinidad Newsday, highlighted the efforts of Melissa Dwarika, a Secondary Entrance Assessment (SEA) class teacher at the Mason Hall Government School in Tobago, to procure learning devices for eight (8) students who had no means of acquiring them. As students in Trinidad and Tobago will be taught virtually, until at least January 2021, a home computer and internet access are no longer a luxury, but rather a necessity.

Melissa decided to raise funds, by selling soup on Saturdays. The TTAO Executive unanimously decided that we could assist these students and forwarded a donation of \$500.00 CAN to her, to assist with the purchase of at least one device for a student who so desperately needs it. The donation from the TTAO was pooled with two other donations to secure tablets for three (3) SEA students.

On behalf of the students, Melissa has expressed heartfelt gratitude and appreciation for the contribution made by the TTAO. As education is the key to success, the association was more than happy to assist.

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Nazru Deen Scholarship 2020

This year, the TTAO scholarship will be awarded in the name of Nazru Deen, one of our members who passed away earlier this year. As was stated in the article about Naz in the April newsletter, he was extremely generous to the TTAO and was a regular donor to our C.L.R. James Scholarship Fund.

This year the TTAO instituted the Nazru Deen Scholarship award. We have received donations from some of our members, and the first recipient will be a student from the Vistabella Presbyterian School in Trinidad, Naz's alma mater. The student will be chosen after the SEA results are released in October 2020.


The Association has been invited to attend the award presentation virtually, which we will happily do.

In Memory of

Dr. Stephen Blizzard



Dr. Stephen Vernon Blizzard was born in Port of Spain, Trinidad and Tobago on October 17th 1928, to Egerton and Engracia Blizzard (née Callender). He attended Queens Royal College in Port of Spain and in 1948 was admitted to Edinburgh University, Scotland, where he graduated with a BSc in Veterinary Science, and in 1954 he became a Member of the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons. While a student, Dr. Blizzard joined the Edinburgh University Air Squadron, where he trained as a pilot.

Upon his return to Trinidad, he worked as a government veterinarian, the youngest person in that field in Trinidad and Tobago at that time, for four years, before moving to Canada in 1958 with his wife, Merle La Borde.

Dr. Blizzard had an illustrious career, which included obtaining his MD, and combining his aviation and medical careers, a move that propelled him to international eminence in aviation medicine. He was a proud member of the Royal Canadian Air Force.

In 2002 when Dr. Blizzard was a Member and Selector of the elite International Academy of Aviation and Space Medicine, the Academy received the Edward Warner Award, the highest honour in the world of aviation. In 2004 he was awarded the prestigious Wilbur Franks Award for significant contribution to Aerospace Medicine and joined a distinguished group, which included astronauts and NASA's Chief Physician. Dr. Blizzard is listed in Cambridge Publishing's 2008 publication, Top 101 Industry Experts. In 2010, he received the Cambridge Publishing's highest honour, "Professional of the Year" in the field of aviation medicine. His list of awards and achievements is inexhaustible.

He served as President of the TTAO in the early 1990s.

Dr. Stephen Blizzard passed away in Ottawa on June 9th, 2020, after a prolonged illness. He leaves to mourn, his wife, Merle and three children. The Executive and members of the TTAO extend sincere condolences to the family.

Ken Gibbs as he was fondly known, was a long time member of the TTAO, serving on various committees in the 1980s and early 1990s, and lending full support to the staging of various events. Kenneth Gibbs passed away on June 20, 2020 at the age of 85, and was predeceased by his beloved wife of 59 years, Faye. He is survived by his daughter Laura and son Craig, three grandchildren and extended family in his native Trinidad.

Love After Love: A Novel by Ingrid Persaud

After Betty Ramdin's husband dies, she invites a colleague, Mr. Chetan, to move in with her and her son, Solo. Over time, the three become a family, loving each other deeply and depending upon one another. Then, one fateful night, Solo overhears Betty confiding in Mr. Chetan and learns a secret that plunges him into torment.

Solo flees Trinidad for New York to carve out a lonely existence as an undocumented immigrant, and Mr. Chetan remains the singular thread holding mother and son together. But soon, Mr. Chetan's own burdensome secret is revealed, with heartbreaking consequences. Love After Love interrogates love and family in all its myriad meanings and forms, asking how we might exchange an illusory love for one that is truly fulfilling.

In vibrant, addictive Trinidadian prose, Love After Love questions who and how we love, the obligations of family, and the consequences of choices made in desperation.

An interactive book series that is based on the importance of good morals and values, as well as fun and exciting activities that kids can enjoy, while learning at the same time. Some of the values that are in the series include kindness, courage and responsibility.

The story of obedience revolves around Timothy protecting his friend Emily from surrendering to peer pressure and disobeying her parents. He also shows her the consequences of her actions. The story of responsibility shows Timothy assisting his friends on the importance of making right decisions. Through his bravery in protecting them from dangerous animals in the forest, Timothy shows his friends that one bad decision can result in a dangerous situation. Lastly, the story of kindness explains why it's so important to be kind to others. It focuses on Timothy protecting an elderly lady from a classroom bully. He educates the bully about the act of kindness and shows him right from wrong.

The ultimate goal for this book series is to inspire the younger generation (young warriors) to have good morals throughout their life and to essentially create a ripple effect for the future generations thereafter.

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Long time ting in the now

Dirt ovens have been a part of Trinibagonian culture for many years, but in recent times we can think of it as a tool of nostalgia. This is a journey cross country to Dove's Dirt Oven Delights in Guayaguayare, run by husband and wife, Sanjid and Caroline, with the assistance of their seven children. It was such a beautiful sight to see just how effortlessly they work together to produce these amazing products in the form of breads, cakes and even pizza.

The family begins the day from as early as 5 a.m. to prepare for customers that begin to come in from 1 p.m. every day, to see and hear about their rich family history and taste just how unique dirt oven products can be. The items are most times prepared on soharee leaves, and when necessary, baking pans and bottomless molds, all made by the family. You can get hops, bread (garlic, molasses, white, whole wheat), coconut bake, sweet bread, non-alcoholic fruit cake, sponge cake and a variety of pizzas. The oven is prepped by burning large pallets in the oven until it reduces to coals and then swept away by a sage leaf broom and the items are then loaded. This technique was passed on from Caroline's father aka Dove, where the business gets its name. The breads are soft and had a unique flavour due to the soharee leaves. The thin crust pizzas are really a treat and don't talk about that non-alcoholic fruit cake...it just brought Christmas early for us.

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
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2020 Trinidad & Tobago General Election Results

The President of Trinidad and Tobago, Paula-Mae Weekes, with the advice of Prime Minister Dr. Keith Rowley, dissolved Parliament and issued the writs for the election on July 3, 2020.

The 2020 Trinidad and Tobago general election was held on Monday August 10, 2020, to elect 41 members to the 12th Trinidad and Tobago Republican Parliament. 21 seats are required for a majority rule. It was the 14th election since gaining independence from the United Kingdom in 1962 and the 22nd national election in Trinidad and Tobago ever.
